

You've collected so much information.

解析: In English, nouns are often classified into countable and uncountable nouns. Countable nouns are nouns that can be counted. For example, pens, erasers, and books are countable nouns since they can be counted. Uncountable nouns, on the other hand, are nouns that cannot be counted. For example, information, water, and milk cannot be counted. These uncountable nouns are treated as singular and so, we would not use plural –s even when the quantity of the uncountable nouns is large as shown in the sentence, "You've collected so much information."

We can also use **some** or **any** with uncountable nouns.

- The teacher offered **some** useful information.
- Do you have **any** information about this **class**?

It is important to note that we cannot use the determiner a/an with uncountable nouns. This would mean that we cannot say "**an information**." But we can say the followings:

- a bottle of water
- a glass of milk
