1. abundant (adj.)

abundantly (adv.)	abundant (adj.)	
	to be abundant with	abundance (n.)

1) When something is <u>abundant</u>, it is plentiful.

例句:Taiwan has <u>abundant</u> natural re<mark>source</mark>s and diverse mountain flora and fauna.

例句: The forest is abundant with wildlife.

2) abundance (n.) – plentiful in supply. In this sense, it is usually followed by the preposition "of."

The growing <u>abundance</u> of medical resources has helped prolonged life expectancy for people.

2. familiar (adj.)

	to be familiar to	
	familiar (adj.)	unfamiliar (adj.)
	to be familiar with	familiarity (n.)

1) Something is <u>familiar</u> if it's commonly known or seen.

例句:He sure looks <u>familiar</u>. But for some reason, I can't remember his name.

2) If someone or something is <u>familiar to</u> you, then you recognize them or know them well.

例句: American culture is familiar to David because he grew up in the United

States.


- 3) The word "familiar" can also mean having personal knowledge or information about something or someone. If you are familiar with something, you know or understand it well.
 - 例句:This problem is difficult to resolve. We need to seek advice from someone familiar with the issue.
 - 例句: Many students of English literature are familiar with Shakespeare.
- 4) familiarity (n.) thorough understanding of a thing or subject
 - 例句:His <u>familiarity</u> with the language and culture helped him enjoy his stay in Japan.
- 5) unfamiliar (adj.) not familiar; strange; having no knowledge of
 - 例句:The teacher told the students to look up the meanings of <u>unfamiliar</u> words in the dictionary.

3. classic

- "Classic" can either be used as a noun or an adjective. As a noun, "classic" may refer to any work of enduring excellence, such as a literary work, or a traditional event. When preceded by the definite article "the," it refers to the literature and languages of ancient Greece and Rome (the classics).
 - 例句:Alexandre Dumas' Lady of the Camellias (茶花女) is a well-known <u>classic</u>.
 - 例句: The dragon boat race is a Dragon Boat Festival classic.

- 2) As an adjective, "classic" means serving as a standard or model of excellence.
 - 例句: The Starry Night by Vincent Van Gogh is a <u>classic</u> piece of art.
- Classical music refers to the formal and more sophisticated types of music, as opposed to popular and folk music.
 - 例句: Symphonies and operas are just two examples of <u>classical</u> music.
- 4. honor (v.)



- 1) To honor someone means to treat them or regard them with special attention and respect.
 - 例句:It is very common <u>to honor</u> the elderlyin Asian cultures.
- 2) When used as a noun, honor can be a source of credit or distinction.
 - 例句:It is my great <u>honor</u> to be invited to such a prestigious event.
- 5. observe (v.)

observe (v.)	observation (n.)
	observant (adj.)

1) observe (v.) – to celebrate (a holiday). If you observe a custom, you follow it.

例句:In Taiwan, people <u>observe</u> Tomb Sweeping Festival, a day on which people visit the tombs of their ancestors to honor them.

例句: Most Europeans observe Christmas traditions, such as decorating Christmas trees.

Another meaning of "observe" is to watch with attention.

例句:The students $\underline{observed}$ while the teacher performed the experiment.

2) observation (n.) – an act of watching attentively

例句:The teacher praised the student for his in-depth <u>observation</u> and analysis of the subject matter.

3) observant (adj.) – alert; quick to notice

例句:The teacher advised the students to be <u>observant</u> when conducting experiments.

6. tradition (n.)

		traditional (adj.)

1) tradition (n.) – a practice or set of practices passed down through generations

例句:Eating rice dumplings and racing dragon boats are <u>traditions</u> of the Dragon Boat Festival.

例句:Americans have the <u>tradition</u> of celebrating Thanksgiving at home with their families.

2) traditional (adj.) – conventional; established; handed down by tradition

例句:It is Mary's dream to be married in a $\underline{\text{traditional}}$ wedding ceremony.
