1. stumped (adj.): to be confused

例句: This math question is so hard! I am completely <u>stumped</u>.

"Stumped" is an informal way of expressing confusion and bafflement. However, there are other usages.

A tree <u>stump</u> is the remainder of the tree in the ground after it has been cut down. To <u>stump</u> something in this sense would be either to turn things into something like a <u>stump</u> (i.e. to reduce a tree to a <u>stump</u>), or to clear away stumps in a field (i.e. I <u>stumped</u> that area already.)

When someone <u>stumps</u> around, it usually means that that person is walking clumsily.

2. eco-friendly (adj.): ecologically-friendly; environmentally friendly

例句: Many industrial companies have decided to go green to save the environment, making <u>eco-friendly</u> gestures and adjustments as they bring about change.

3. buoyancy (n.): the capacity to remain floating (in liquid)

例句: Life vests must have good <u>buoyancy</u>.

<u>Buoyancy</u> can also mean the ability to recover quickly from setbacks, or resilience. It can also take on a third meaning: cheerfulness.

If someone is <u>buoyant</u>, it either means he or she is happy, or that the person is very resilient.

If something is <u>buoyant</u>, it means it stays afloat when thrown into water, such as wood, Styrofoam, or sponge.

A <u>buoy</u> is a floating item that is placed in the water as a visual marker. To <u>buoy</u> is to remain floating, or to support.

4. guaranteed (adj.): to be certain

例句: It is <u>guaranteed</u> that if one pokes a hole in a balloon, it will pop.

To guarantee is to vouch for someone or something.

5. folks (n.): guys, people (informal) TITAS BONITAS

例句: Alright, <u>folks</u>, let's start the party.

It is important to note that, <u>folk</u> as a noun does not refer to one person, but a group of people.

The connotation for folk is that it refers more to people of the countryside, or old-fashioned, traditional.

As an adjective, <u>folk</u> means "down-to-earth, open-hearted."

Folklore refers to traditional beliefs, tales, or myths.
